## 1998 MC Masters

June 24-26, 1998 Fleet 54 Hoover Yacht Club, Ohio

The 6th Annual MC Masters Nationals was hosted by Hoover Yacht Club in Westerville, Ohio, June 24th thru the 26th. A fleet of 26 boats assembled to challenge Tim Fredman's title. The week was unseasonably hot, a preview of the sweltering summer to come, but there was wind and a total of 6 races were completed.

Also participating in the regatta was HYC sailor, George Fisher. George Fisher is a champion sailor in many one-design classes, but was quite new to the MC, sailing his son Greg's boat for roughly three weeks before the regatta.

In the first race, George demonstrated what a quick study he is by finishing in 1st place. Second was Bud Leonard of Diamond Lake YC, and third place was Jack Kern of Rush Creek Yacht Club, Texas. The afternoon race saw the winds diminish and become a bit more erratic. Kern finished 1st, Jim Hatch 2nd, and Leonard 3rd.

After the day's racing there were masseuses set up in the club house to provide free massages for all the sore-backed sailors. The surprise entertainment at dinner was a visit from a 14-member ensemble of the Ohio State University marching band. They played all the local favorites along with a unique rendition of the Michigan fight song (just a bit out of time and tune!).

Overall it was Jack Kern in 1st place and Top Grand Master. 2nd overall and top Mega Master honors went to George Fisher followed by Curt Bradley and Fred Bedford. Paul Eggert took 3rd overall and 2nd Grand Masters. Top Master in 4th overall was Jim Hatch. Hardy Will took 5th overall.

It was a great regatta with fun sailing and entertaining shore-side activities as well. Hoover YC thanks all the Masters for coming.

## MC in a Pointy-bow World

I finally met IMCCSRA member Tom Callis who lives in the Philadelphia area at the 1998 Masters regatta and asked him about his sailing near Philadelphia. Here is his response.

"I race my MC Scow in the pointy-bow world. I am the only scow sailor in my

sailing club, the Nockamixon Sail Club. We have several active one-design fleets (Thistles, Lightnings, Flying Scots) and a strong Portsmouth handicap fleet that includes these boats as well as an assortment of small keel boats like J-22, Impulse, etc. While it is clear that the best racing is against other MC Scows, in the few years that I have been sailing my boat I have done quite well against these other boats. In light air particularly, the MC is an excellent performer. Only the Thistle moves more quickly in those

conditions, but I have beaten them. Last year, in our club championship race, with each fleet represented and in very shifty conditions, I won two our of three races, and thus became our club champion. So if you happen to belong to a club without other MC sailors, all is not lost. In fact much can happen that makes other boat owners sit up and take notice of these flat-bottom, blunt-nose designs.
