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Keys to Success

It has been my experience that a good start and a good weather leg usually make for a good finish. You should begin preparing for the start of a race before you leave the dock. Make sure all rigging is working properly.

Read the Sailing Instructions before attending the skippers' meeting, listen carefully and don't be afraid to ask questions if there is something you don't understand. Make sure you have all information and instructions concerning the race and place those SIs in the boat where they can easily be found.

On the way out to the race course take note of wind shifts. When the starting line is set, find the favored end. Start in clear air if possible.

Concentration also plays a big part in winning. I have found that the skipper who never lets anything interrupt his concentration always does well.
