The youngest sailor, Gregg Chinik, showed his skill by finishing 4th in this race. Burl Murphy from the newly formed Dixie Sailing Club (Mongomery, AL) had a great 5th place. Michael Lenkeit led father Willi across the line in the last race Sunday.

Hats off to Frank Keenen who, despite not feeling well, finished 5th overall and won the Grand Masters trophy.

GRYC Spring Regatta

I very seldom go to regattas with a crew and this was no different. On Friday night the wind blew 12-28 all through the night. I hoped it would blow itself out. Saturday morning it was still windy with a forecast of 10 to 20 mph. I had a decision to make right away. After conferring with Jim Gluek I decided it would be wise to go with a heavy air sail (good choice). Just about everyone had crew on board at the starting line of the first race, even the 180 to 210 pound sailors. I'm 170+. The temperature was down around 55° and everyone was in foul-weather gear.

Shortly before the first start I discovered two things right away. First, it was a very gusty and shifty wind and second, it was going to be tough to hang with the boats with crew. My strategy was going to be to stay away from the pack and react to the shifts.

On the first leg I was in good shape as we approached the windward pin, although I had felt out of control most of the leg. I was fiddling with the controls when I got hit by a blast and couldn't get the sheet uncleated. Rather too quickly I found myself with one arm and one leg on the hull and the other arm and leg clinging to the edge of the cockpit, praying I could save it. I did, only to come about and do it all over again on the other side! Fortunately I saved it, and didn't get wet. Tom Wurster sailed by to see if all was alright, asking, "Was I having a stroke!" Well, needless to say I lost a few boats. We all know the feeling of being out of control. I salvaged a 14th that race and attributed it to lack of control due to the conditions.
