Winn Story and Willi Lenkeit were once again the prime contenders for the right to have their name engraved on the Rebel Rouser Perpetual trophy. Picking up where he left off after last years regatta, Winn Story came from behind to win the first race over Jim Gray by four feet with Willi's son Michael third. Willi, Bill Nolan and Winn mastered the rain and shifting wind to finish the second race in that order. The third race turned into a dash for the dock as lightning showed up to spoil the fun.

Sunday's racing began at 9:00 am with a heavy cloud cover. Winn led the way in the third race, catching wind which he kept all to himself to finish with a comfortable lead. The youngest sailor, Gregg Chinik, showed his skill by finishing 4th in this race. Burl Murphy from the newly formed Dixie Sailing Club (Mongomery, AL) had a great 5th place. Michael Lenkeit led father Willi across the line in the last race Sunday.

Hats off to Frank Keenen who, despite not feeling well, finished 5th overall and won the Grand Masters trophy.

GRYC Spring Regatta

Reeds Lake, Grand Rapids, MI May 18 - 19, 1991

I very seldom go to regattas with a crew and this was no different. On Friday night the wind blew 12-28 all through the night. I hoped it would blow itself out. Saturday morning it was still windy with a forecast of 10 to 20 mph. I had a decision to make right away. After conferring with Jim Gluek I decided it would be wise to go with a heavy air sail (good choice). Just about everyone had crew on board at the starting line of the first race, even the 180 to 210 pound sailors. I'm 170+. The temperature was down around 55° and everyone was in foul-weather gear.

Shortly before the first start I discovered two things right away. First, it was a very gusty and shifty wind and second, it was going to be tough to hang with the boats with crew. My strategy was going to be to stay away from the pack and react to the shifts.

On the first leg I was in good shape as we approached the windward pin, although I had felt out of control most of the leg. I was fiddling with the controls when I got hit by a blast and couldn't get the sheet uncleated. Rather too quickly I found myself with one arm and one leg on the hull and the other arm and leg clinging to the edge of the cockpit, praying I could save it. I did, only to come about and do it all over again on the other side! Fortunately I saved it, and didn't get wet. Tom Wurster sailed by to see if all was alright, asking, "Was I having a stroke!" Well, needless to say I lost a few boats. We all know the feeling of being out of control. I salvaged a 14th that race and attributed it to lack of control due to the conditions.

After that race I decided the key to sailing in these conditions (they persisted into the three races Sunday morning) was to gain control of the boat. I had to get my head out of the boat and watch the puffs and shifts, and be able to handle them when they hit. I (continued on page 3)

kept the same strategy of staying away from the pack, particularly at the start. Each race I had very good starts, on the line with good boat speed. I let the traveler out to within 2 or 3 inches of the cockpit edge shortly after the start. I sacrificed pointing for control and boat speed. This move proved to be the best decision I made the whole regatta. By laying off the traveler I found I could control the boat much better and could really power through the puffs without being blown out of control. Upwind, I set the vang, cunningham and outhaul and stopped worrying about them and began concentrating on the wind and getting to the pin as fast as possible.

Sunday was much the same wind (east all weekend). I used the same strategy and was very successful. I probably didn't have the boat speed of those with crew, nor the pointing ability, but I felt under control and if I paid attention and made good decisions and clean tacks I was competitive. (Paul's 2nd place finish speaks for itself.)
