Some of Andy Burdick's comments on this regatta follow.

Race 1: S-SW winds 10-20 mph

The course was W3 - downwind finish. I started in the middle so I could take advantage of the first shift. A left shift hit and I tacked to cross all the boats on the right. The boats to the left were hooked up good, but I was patient. A big right hit me and I crossed all the boats on left and rounded the top mark first. Zack Clayton followed. Down wind I sailed by the lee and was very fast.

Rounding the mark I cranked on vang and cunningham very hard and dropped my traveller 4". This was fast and I sailed the shifts. I only sailed a headed tack when I was headed for more wind. You really had to be in the lanes of breeze.

Race 2 was much the same as Race 1 but I took crew and our weight was 300 lbs. which is about maximum I like to sail with. With crew I could keep the traveller on center. Remember, never let the lee rail get wet. In a big breeze you must pull on the vang hard.

To eliminate nose diving, heel the boat to windward and increase vang tension. You can also trim the main. If the boat wants to death roll head up not down. And, in a big shot reach off for stability.

Race 3: More of the same except the breeze eased off and my crew was sitting in the middle of the boat. In these conditions the crew can help roll tack the boat.

Race 4: I mis-timed the start and had to restart and found myself the only boat on port tack. Because of a big left shift I rounded the top mark in 2nd behind Pete Toumanoff. I got impatient and jibed into what turned out to be a lull and Toumanoff, Bob Burdick, Lieber and Fink beat me around the mark. Lesson: Stay with the leaders!

Race 5: Wind was at most 10 mph in the puffs and there were lots of holes.

With a minute to go the left was very favored so I raced down from the middle of the line to get under Bill Lieber. We were the two leeward-most boats. I nailed the pin with a great start. I forced Lieber to the right as I out-pointed him. However, he found the only port lift to the center of the course. Then a big right hit and most of the fleet was on top of me. I rounded about 16th.

Downwind I made big gains just by looking behind me for the wind and I jibed through puffs just to maximize my time in them. I moved up to 7th.

By sailing the shifts on the windward leg I moved up to 4th about 75 yards behind the leaders. With some nice lifts and always staying on the lifted tack and going towards the weather mark I managed to move into 4th

On the downwind leg there were four boats ahead of me, Lieber and Heimsch sailed huge headers on starboard. I sailed a port lift with 1558 to take the lead over Heimsch

and Lieber and 1558. However we all hit a big hole in the middle of the course. We drifted for a few minutes until the wind hit Lieber first and he took the lead. At the finish Lieber and Burdick were in a dead heat with Lieber taking the win.

Notes: What was fast in this race? Being in the wind was everything. When I did get velocity I found that easing my main a touch and bearing off a bit, then hiking out very hard and trimming then pointing was fast. I was able to sail higher and faster eventually. That is how I went from 16th to 2nd in this last race. Many sailors would get a puff, trim and head up right away which is the normal tendency because you want to go fast and point to the moon with the new breeze you found. Try practicing the opposite. Ease a touch, this straightens the mast and makes your sail fuller (no vang at all). Bear off and then once up to speed hike, trim and point with the acceleration that you have. This works!

My mast was raked at 28'-3" and the sidestays were taut (not drum tight) the entire regatta.
