A Great MC Story

I had an interesting conversation at the Masters Regatta with long-time MC sailor and 1976 Commodore of IMCCSRA, Bill Crum of the Lake Eustis Sailing Club in Florida. Seems he was not entirely content with sailing his Sunfish on Crooked Lake near his home in Bartow. Bill heard tell of a new 16' scow being built by Melges Boat Works. A call to Melges was shortly followed up by Smiley Freytag who showed up in Bill and Betty's front yard with a stack of M20s. Bill liked their looks and asked Smiley to unload one for him. However, Smiley was returning these boats to Zenda for updating from a regatta at Royal Palm Yacht Club in Fort Myers And besides, Smiley said what Bill really wanted was an MC. The year was 1971.

Smiley told him to get in touch with Carl Theiss at Lake Fairview near Orlando for a ride on his MC, there being a small fleet at that lake. On his way to a business meeting, dressed in suit and tie, Bill contacted Carl and met him at the lake. Bill remembers taking off his shoes, rolling up his pants, and wading out to the mooring for his first ride on an MC. That boat was #34 and named Slick Chick. He was so impressed that he contacted Smiley to order a boat. Smiley told him of MC #18 which had been sold on credit nearby, but that the owner was unable to pay. Bill managed to pay off Melges and acquire the boat which he sailed for some time. However, he felt it wasn't fast enough so he ordered and received a new MC, #72.

At the beginning of the 1972 Midwinters Bill offered the "slow" #18 to Scooter Kinsey, a young sailor on the sailing team at Tulane who promptly smoked the whole fleet including Bill in his new boat. Scooter's crew for that event was his mother Jody.

Incidentally, #72 is now on Lake Eustis being sailed by Dennis Oldham who won several club races last year using a used sail he purchased from Happy Fox.
